### Agenda Item No.3.1: Annual Report and Audited Annual Accounts for the financial year 2011-12.

- 1. The Annual Accounts of the Board are maintained in the form prescribed by the Government and as laid down under Section 25 of the NCR Planning Board Act, 1985, read with Rule 33 of the NCR Planning Board Rules, 1985. The audit of Accounts and transactions has been conducted by O/o Principal Director of Commercial Audit, New Delhi on behalf of Comptroller and Auditor General of India.
- 2. The Annual Report and Audited Annual Accounts of 2011-12 duly approved by the Chairman & Hon'ble Minister for Urban Development was circulated to the members for approval by circulation. After receipt of approval, these were laid before both the houses of Parliament i.e. on the table of Lok Sabha on 13.3.2013 and Rajya Sabha on 7.3.2013.

The matter is placed before the Board for information.

Agenda Item No.3.2: Annual Statement of outstanding loans and advances disbursed by the Board during the year 2011-12 & 2012-13 as per Rule 47(1) of NCRPB Rules, 1985.

- 1. The Annual Statements of outstanding loan/ advances for the year 2011-12 & 2012-13 are submitted in Form 'G', proviso to Rule 47(1), NCR Planning Board Rules, 1985. The Form 'G' is placed at **Annexure -3.2/I & 3.2/II.**
- 2. The main highlights of Loan/Advances released by the Board are as under:-

#### Financial Year 2011-12: Highlights

- During 2011-12, the Board had sanctioned loan assistance of Rs.542.60 crores for 12 new Infrastructure projects.
- During the Financial Year 2011-12, the NCR Planning Board disbursed an amount of Rs.613.65 Cr. to Constituent States and their implementing agencies for 35 ongoing and new development projects.
- There has been 100% recovery of all the repayments due upto 31.3.2012 except one repayment due from Patiala Urban Planning & Development Authority (PDA), Govt. of Punjab in respect of sewerage scheme of Patiala Municipal Corporation (PDA). The overdue amount from PDA has now been received from the agency on 23.5.2013 along with interest/penal interest. Therefore, as on date, there is no default in repayment of any loan.

#### Financial Year 2012-13: Highlights

- During 2012-13, the Board had sanctioned loan assistance of Rs.683.87 crores for 13 new Infrastructure projects.
- During the financial year 2012-13, the NCR Planning Board disbursed an amount of Rs.418.51 Cr. to Constituent States and their implementing agencies for 23 ongoing and new development projects.
- There has been no default in repayment of loan by State Governments and their implementing agencies. Recovery has been 100%.

The matter is placed before the Board for information in accordance with Rule 47(1) of the NCR Planning Board Rules, 1985.

## Agenda Item No.3.3: Annual Statement of outstanding loans and advances received by the Board during the year 2011-12 & 2012-13 as per Rule 47(2) of the NCRPB Rules, 1985.

- 1. The Annual Statement of outstanding loans/advances received by the Board is submitted in Form 'H', proviso to Rule 47(2), NCR Planning Board Rules, 1985. The Form 'H' is placed at **Annexure 3.3/I & 3.3/II**.
- 2. The highlights of Loans/Advances received by the Board are as under:

#### Financial Year 2011-12: Highlights

- Loan agreement between KfW and NCRPB signed on 9.2.2012 for Euro 100 million to be utilized up to Dec.2015.
- Board has not raised any additional amount from the domestic Capital Market or from Multilateral and Bi-lateral agencies during 2011-12.
- All payments due, on account of interest have been released to the NCRPB bond holders on time. There is no default on repayment of any loan on part of the Board.
- Dutstanding domestic market borrowing as on 31st March, 2012 was Rs.1100 crores.

#### Financial Year 2012-13: Highlights

- Board has not raised any amount from the domestic Capital Market.
- Board has received loan amounting to Rs.208.09 crore from Multilateral and Bilateral agencies (Rs.99.64 crore from Asian Development Bank & Rs.108.45 crore from KfW Bank, Germany).
- All payments due on account of interest & commitment charges have been paid to the investors and the donor agencies on time. There was no default on repayment of any loan on part of the Board.
- Outstanding borrowings as on 31st March, 2013 was Rs.1309.26 crores (i.e. domestic, ADB & KfW including exchange rate variations).
- 3. Following funds were raised from the domestic capital market in the form of taxable bonds. These Bonds are rated 'AAA with Stable Outlook' by CRISIL, ICRA and Fitch ratings which is the highest rating provided by these agencies. The status of bond issue is given below:

- The Budget Estimates for the financial Year 2013-14 were submitted to the Ministry of Urban Development on 11.10.2012. The statements of Plan and Non-Plan Budget Estimates for the year 2013-14 is at **Annexure-3.4/I.**
- 2. As against the Budget Estimates 2013-14 submitted by the office of the NCRPB, the following budget (Plan as well as Non-Plan) has been provided in Demands for Grants by Government of India for the BE 2013-14:-

The Budget Estimates for the financial year 2013-14, both under the head "Plan (Capital) and Non-Plan (Revenue)" are placed before the Board for its approval. Further, Member Secretary may be authorized for taking decisions regarding resource mobilization programme of NCRPB by raising Bonds and/or through borrowing from multilateral/ bi-lateral aid agencies and take necessary decisions in respect of various approvals / formalities required to be taken / completed in this regard.

National Capital Region Planning Board (NCRPB) had prepared a 'Functional Plan on Transport-2032', which recommended eight Regional Rapid Transit System (RRTS) Corridors to connect various important towns of NCR with high speed rail based commuter transit system. In 2009, the Task Force constituted by Planning Commission headed by Secretary (UD) prioritized following three corridors of RRTS for implementation in Phase-I:

- 4.2 Feasibility Studies of the above three prioritized corridors have been completed and circulated to participating State Governments. Draft Detailed Project Reports (DPRs) will be finalized by the end of this month.
- 4.3 Following actions were decided in the last Board meeting:
  - i) A quick dispersal study would be conducted.
  - ii) RRTS projects would be discussed separately in a Special Meeting with the NCR participating States.
  - iii) State Governments would expedite the notification of alignment and give suggestions on the financing pattern.
- 4.4 Accordingly, Dispersal Study for the stations/interchanges in Delhi for three prioritized RRTS corridors has been conducted and circulated on 25.10.12. This was discussed in the Chief Minister's meeting held under the Chairmanship of Minister, Urban Development on 29.11.2012.
- 4.5 National Highway Authority of India (NHAI) vide letters dated 16.11.2012 and 29.11.2012 has given consent for Delhi-Panipat and Delhi-Alwar RRTS corridors respectively. The approval for Delhi-Meerut RRTS Corridor is awaited.
- 4.6 The RRTS projects would be implemented through a Joint Venture Company i.e. NCR Transport Corporation (NCRTC) under Ministry of Urban Development, wherein Government of India and NCR Planning Board and participating State Governments would be stakeholders. The Equity contribution of Government of India and participating State Governments would be as follows:

- 4.7 The Expenditure Finance Committee (EFC) headed by Secretary (Expenditure) recommended the constitution of National Capital Region Transport Corporation (NCRTC) under the Company's Act, 1956 on 02.05.2013. The Cabinet Note for constitution of NCRTC is under circulation.
- 4.8 It was proposed in the EFC memo that till the NCRTC is formed, an RRTS Cell of 5-6 officers may be created in NCR Planning Board to take the DPRs forward to avoid cost and time overrun. The RRTS Cell will be manned by officers on deputation from DMRC, other Metro Rail Corporations, etc. till NCRTC is formed. The salaries of this Cell will be borne by NCR Planning Board and once the NCRTC is incorporated, the NCRTC will decide upon the retention of the officers manning the RRTS Cell in the NCR Planning Board.

## Agenda Item No.5: Projects/Studies approved by the Project Sanctioning & Monitoring Group (PSMG).

Two PSMG-I, meetings (48<sup>th</sup> and 49<sup>th</sup>) were held under the chairmanship of Secretary, MoUD, GOI on 31.5.2012 and 11.12.2012 respectively to consider sanction of loans, study proposals since the last Board meeting held on 22.3.2012. The 48<sup>th</sup> PSMG-I meeting approved the study "Creation and Updation of Landuse for Review of Regional Plan 2021 for National Capital Region (NCR) through National Remote Sensing Centre (NRSC), Department of Space, Government of India" and the 49<sup>th</sup> PSMG-I meeting approved sanction of loans for 13 projects at an estimated cost of Rs.950.75 crores. ### Agenda Item No.6: Status Note on Assistance by Asian Development Bank (ADB) and KfW (German Development Bank) to NCRPB.

#### **Asian Development Bank**

1. ADB has approved a loan of US \$ 150 million to NCRPB as a multi-tranche financing facility for financing infrastructure projects in the National Capital Region (NCR) and its Counter Magnet Areas (CMAs). The loan agreement for the 1<sup>st</sup> tranche of US \$ 78 million has been signed between ADB and NCRPB on 17.3.2011. The loan has been made effective from 29.6.2011 and to be utilized by Dec., 2014. The repayment period will be 25 years with a 5 years moratorium for repayment of the principal amount.

The loan is being disbursed to participating States subject to compliance with ADB procurement guidelines and environmental and social safeguards requirements. As on date, the following amount has been drawn by the Board from ADB:-

#### KfW-(German Development Bank)

3. A Loan of Euro 100 million + Euro 1 million Grant for environment friendly schemes in the water supply, sewerage, drainage, solid waste management and urban transport Sectors to National Capital Region Planning Board was negotiated by the Deptt. of Economic Affairs, Ministry of Finance with KfW. The loan and other related agreements were signed on 9th February, 2012 & 30.3.2012. The repayment period will be 15 years with a 5 years moratorium for repayment of the principal amount. The loan is at a fixed rate of Interest @ 1.83% p.a. A total amount of Rs.108.45 Crores has been claimed & disbursed by KfW to the Board. Board is also been making regular repayments to KfW.

These projects are proposed to be funded through NCRPB under the KfW line of credit. The details are at **Annexure-6/I**.

<u>Point for decision</u>: The matter is placed before the Board for information and deliberation.

## Agenda Item No.7: Consideration and approval of the Draft Revised Regional Plan-2021 for NCR for inviting public objections and suggestions under Section 12 of NCRPB Act, 1985.

- 7.1 The NCR Planning Board had prepared the Regional Plan 2021 with the active participation of the NCR constituent States of Haryana, Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh and NCT-Delhi, and the Central Ministries concerned. The Regional Plan 2021 was approved by the Board in its 28th meeting held on 09.07.05 and notified under Section 13 of NCRPB Act, 1985 and Rule 27 of NCRPB Act, 1985 on 17<sup>th</sup> September 2005.
- 7.2 As per provisions of the Section 15 of the NCR Planning Board Act, 1985, Regional Plan is required to be reviewed after every five years from the date of its operation. The provisions under Section 15 are given below:
- 15. (1) After every five years from the date of coming into operation of the finally prepared Regional Plan, the Board shall review such Regional Plan in its entirety and may, after such review, substitute it by a fresh Regional Plan or may make such modifications or alterations therein as may be found by it to be necessary.
  - (2) Where it is proposed to substitute a fresh Regional Plan in place of the Regional Plan which was previously finally prepared or where it is proposed to make any modifications or alterations in the finally prepared Regional Plan, such fresh Plan or, as the case may be, modifications or alternations, shall be published and dealt with in the same manner as if it were the Regional Plan referred to in Sections 12 and 13 or as if they were the modifications or alterations in the Regional Plan made under Section 14.
- 7.3 Board has initiated the review and revision exercise for the Regional Plan 2021 in July, 2012. A Steering Committee under the Chairpersonship of Member Secretary, NCR Planning Board was constituted on 17.07.2012 to oversee the work of review of the Plan. Study Groups were formed for the review and revision exercise of Regional Plan 2021 for NCR.
- 7.4 Draft revised Chapters of the Regional Plan-2021 were deliberated in four meetings of the Steering Committee. Extensive consultations were held in the Workshops with the NCR participating State Governments and concerned Central Govt. Ministries/Departments after finalization of the draft chapters on Water, Transport and Environment on 21.11.12, 26.11.12 and 07.02.2013 respectively. The final Draft Revised Regional Plan 2021 was also presented in the Workshop on "Review and Revision of the Regional Plan-2021" held on 28.05.2013. The Workshop was attended by representatives of the State Govts. as well as the concerned Central Govt. Ministries/Departments. The recommendations and suggestions emanating from these workshops and the formal comments received from the State Govts. and concerned Central Govt. Ministries/Departments have been duly incorporated in the respective chapters.
- 7.5 The draft revised Regional Plan-2021 was discussed in the 61<sup>st</sup> meeting of the Planning Committee held on 04.06.2013 and the Planning Committee recommended the draft revised Regional Plan-2021 for placing the same before the Board for approval for inviting objections/suggestions. A copy of the draft revised Regional Plan-2021 for NCR is enclosed at Annexure-7/I.

<u>Point for decision</u>: The Draft Revised Regional Plan-2021 for NCR duly recommended by the Planning Committee is placed before the Board for consideration and approval for inviting objections/suggestions from the public under section 12(1) of the NCRPB Act, 1985.

### Agenda Item No.8: Consideration and approval of Draft Sub-Regional Plan-2021 for U.P. Sub-Region.

- 8.1 Under Section 17(1) of the NCRPB Act, 1985 "Each participating State shall prepare a Sub-Regional Plan for the sub-region within that State and the Union Territory shall prepare a Sub-Regional Plan for the sub-region within the Union territory".
- 8.2 In the 29th Meeting of the Board held on 24.05.2006, the representatives of the Constituent States were requested to prepare the Sub-Regional Plans of their respective Sub-regions. Accordingly, the NCR participating States had initiated preparation of Sub-Regional Plans for their respective Sub-regions.
- 8.3 The Housing & Urban Planning Department, Govt. of U.P. vide letter No. 338/8-3-2012-272 /11 dated 31.01.2012 had submitted the Draft Sub-Regional Plan for U.P. Sub-Region-2021/31 to NCR Planning Board. After examination, Board vide letter No.K-14011/109/2006-Vol.III dated 14.03.2012 sent its observations to Govt. of U.P. for incorporation in the Draft Sub-Regional Plan for U.P. Sub-Region-2021/31.
- 8.4 Incorporating Board's comments and suggestions, Govt. of U.P. has submitted the amended Draft Sub-Regional Plan for U.P. Sub-Region-2021 vide letter No.Bha.Sa.22/8-3-13-272 Vividh/11 T.C.II dated 29.03.2013. The revised Draft Sub-Regional Plan for U.P. Sub-Region-2021 was examined by the Board and comments and observations of Board's Secretariat were sent vide letter No.K-14011/109/2006-Vol.-V dated 02.05.2013 to Govt. of U.P. for incorporation.
- 8.5 The Govt. of Uttar Pradesh vide letter No.1005(1)/8-3-13-272 Vividh/11T.C.II dated 22.05.2013 submitted the amended UP Sub-Regional Plan-2021 along with the comments of the Govt. of UP on the NCRPB's observations / suggestions on the amended Sub-Regional Plan for UP Sub-Region-2021. A CD containing the draft Sub-Regional Plan-2021 for UP Sub-region is enclosed (Annexure-8/I).
- 8.6 The Sub-Regional Plan for UP Sub-Region-2021 was placed before the 61<sup>st</sup> Planning Committee held on 04.06.2013. Planning Committee after detailed deliberations recommended the same with the following conditions:
- 1. Existing Landuse analysis and the existing Landuse Map-2012 of NCR prepared by NRSC, Department of Space, Govt. of India will be incorporated in the Sub-Regional Plan-2021.
- 2. Zoning Regulations of Draft Sub-Regional Plan for UP Sub-Region-2021 will be in conformity with Regional Plan-2021.
- 3. Urbanisable area of Master Plan of Metro Centres and Regional Centres in the UP Sub-region to be as per the approved Master Plans- 2021.
- 4. Observations/suggestions of NCRPB which have not been incorporated in the Sub-Regional Plan mentioned in para (iv) of the Minutes of the 61<sup>st</sup> Planning Committee be incorporated.

<u>Point for decision</u>: Draft Sub-Regional Plan for UP Sub-Region-2021 along with the recommendations with conditions of the Planning Committee is placed before the Board for consideration and approval.

### Agenda Item No.9: Request of State Governments for revised funding pattern for preparation of Sub-Regional Plans.

- 9.1 Under Section 17(1) of the NCRPB Act, 1985 "Each participating State shall prepare a Sub-Regional Plan for the sub-region within that State and the Union Territory shall prepare a Sub-Regional Plan for the sub-region within the Union territory".
- 9.2 The NCR participating State Governments requested the NCRPB to outsource the work of preparation of Sub-Regional Plans to enable them to prepare these Plans through bidding in a time bound manner. The matter was placed before the PSMG-I in its 39<sup>th</sup> meeting held on 25.07.2007. The PSMG-I accorded in-principle approval with a maximum of Rs.54 lakhs for each sub-region from NCRPB and additional cost, if any, on the preparation of the Sub-Regional Plan will be borne by the respective State Governments.
- 9.3 The proposal for the consideration and approval of full Consultancy charges for the preparation of Sub-Regional Plan-2021 by constituent States of Rajasthan, U.P. & Haryana was again placed before the PSMG-I held on 31.05.2010. In the meeting, PSMG approved the proposal of funding entire cost of study as awarded by the NCR participating States.
- 9.4 In the 32<sup>nd</sup> meeting of the Board held on 22.03.2012, the status of preparation of Sub-Regional Plans was reviewed. It was informed that Board was providing funds for preparation of Sub-Regional Plan to the respective State Government. Secretary, Ministry of Urban Development, Govt. of India suggested that the State may contribute at least 50% of the total cost for preparation of Sub-Regional Plans which was agreed by the Board.
- 9.5 Principal Secretary, Housing & Urban Planning Department, Govt. of U.P. vide letter No.1987/8-3-12-12विविध/12 dated 22.03.2013 (Annexure-9/I) has submitted that PSMG-I held on 25.07.2007 approved Rs.54 lakh for the preparation of Sub-Regional Plan through outsourcing and requested that entire cost may be paid by the NCRPB.
- 9.6 Additional Chief Secretary, Local Self Government, Department of Urban Development & Housing, Govt. of Rajasthan vide letter no.TPR/NCR/SRPIII/2013/604 dated 01.05.2013 (Annexure-9/II) submitted that according to the minutes of the 32<sup>nd</sup> Board meeting, 50% of the cost of consultancy towards preparation of Sub-Regional Plan is to be borne by the participating State Government. However, while awarding the work of consultancy for Rajasthan Sub-Regional Plan, 100% cost towards the consultancy was to be borne by NCRPB and requested the Board to bear the 100% cost of consultancy as committed earlier by the Board.
- 9.7 Board has not received any request from the Govt. of Haryana for bearing 100% cost of consultancy for preparation of the Sub-Regional Plan.

<u>Point for decision</u>: The requests of Governments of U.P. and Rajasthan for bearing 100% cost of consultancy for preparation of the Sub-Regional Plans of Uttar Pradesh and Rajasthan Sub-region respectively placed before the Board for consideration and approval.

Agenda Item No.10: Consideration of Proposals for inclusion of additional areas in NCR and identification of Jaipur as Counter-Magnet Area.

#### 10.1 Proposal of inclusion of Additional Areas in NCR.

#### Rajasthan

Board has received the proposal for inclusion of Bharatpur district in NCR from Government of Rajasthan vide letter no. TPR/NCR/BHARATPUR/11/30 dated 12.01.2012 is placed at **Annexure-10/I**. In the proposal following potentials of Bharatpur District have been stated:

- Bharatpur is contiguous to existing NCR boundary (Alwar district).
- Good connectivity by road and rail.
- Bharatpur district is part of Golden triangle Delhi Agra Jaipur.
- It would help in achieving a balanced and harmonious development of NCR.
- It is a part of the proposed Bharatpur Kota Development Corridor.
- It would help in dispersal of economic activities from Delhi.

#### Haryana

2. Board has received request for inclusion of **Mahendragarh** and **Bhiwani** districts of Haryana in NCR jointly from Shri Rao Dan Singh, Chief Parliamentary Secretary; Shri Satpal Sangwan, Cooperation Minister and Shri Rao Narender Singh, Health Minister, Haryana vide letter no. Nil dated 15.06.2012 addressed to Hon'ble Minister for Urban Development from Ministry of Urban Development is placed at **Annexure-10/II.** Subsequently, Board has received a request vide D.O. letter no. PHED/428/2012 dated 05.07.2012 from Smt. Kiran Chaudhary, Public Health Engineering, Excise & Taxation Minister, Govt. of Haryana addressed to Hon'ble Minister for Urban Development for inclusion of Bhiwani and Narnual Towns of Haryana in NCR is placed at **Annexure-10/III.** 

Chief Coordinator Planner (NCR), Haryana vide Memo no. CCP(NCR)/2012/3061 dated 19.09.2012 intimated that the Government has approved the proposal for the inclusion of the districts of Bhiwani and Mahendragarh in NCR (Annexure-10/IV). Secretaries incharge of Commerce and Industry, Industrial Policy and Promotion, Expenditure, Power Road Transport & Highways, Rural Development, Chairman, Railway Board (all from the Govt. of India), Principal Advisor (HUD), Planning Commission, and Vice Chairman, Delhi Development Authority, to perform the functions of the proposed Executive Committee. 



### Minutes of the 33rd meeting of the NCR Planning Board held on 1st July, 2013

- i) The 33<sup>rd</sup> meeting of the NCR Planning Board was held on 1<sup>st</sup> July, 2013 at 11.00 A.M in Silver Oak Hall, India Habitat Centre, Lodhi Road, New Delhi under the chairmanship of Shri Kamal Nath, Union Minister for Urban Development and Chairman, NCR Planning Board. List of participants is at Annexure-I.
- ii) Smt. Naini Jayaseelan, Member Secretary, NCR Planning Board welcomed the Union Minister for Urban Development and Chairman, NCR Planning Board, Members of the Board and officers from Central Ministries and State Governments. She stated NCR is the most urbanized region with 62% urbanization level. She further added that Delhi has registered lowest decadal growth rate during last decade in NCR. She stated that the work of review and revision of Regional Plan-2021 has been completed and has been placed as an Agenda item No. 7. Regional Plan-2021 has provided for inter-state regional projects and most notable of them is Regional Rapid Transit System (RRTS), which will improve connectivity within the region and make NCR a vibrant social and economic entity.
- iii) Dr. Sudhir Krishna, Secretary, Ministry of Urban Development, Govt. of India stated that significant progress has been made in NCR for integrated development with the active participation, cooperation and collaboration of the NCR participating States.
- iv) Hon'ble Shri Kamal Nath, Union Minister for Urban Development and Chairman, NCR Planning Board stated that NCRPB was established in 1985 through an Act of Parliament with the concurrence of the State Legislatures of Haryana, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh, for harmonious development and balanced growth in the Region.

Chairman stated that NCT Delhi, the core of the NCR, is one of the fifteen major urban agglomerations of the World. As per 2011 census, the population of Delhi has reached 16.75 million. Delhi is the second largest metropolis of the country. It experienced a high growth rate in 80's and 90's due to a unprecedented population influx. However, the rate of growth of population of Delhi declined from 47% in 1991-2001 to 20.96% during 2001-11, which is the lowest among all the four Sub-regions of NCR, due to the coordinated efforts of NCRPB and NCR participating States. At an urbanisation level of 62%, NCR is the highest urbanised area in the country, and it will continue to be the hub of economic activity and will continue to attract people from all over the country. With a younger demographic profile, the need for mobility is even more. NCR Planning Board's strategy has been to assist the State Govts. at all levels to develop the region in a more equitable, efficient, sustainable and environment friendly manner.

Chairman stated that it was heartening to know that the Regional Plan 2021 has been taken up for review and that the draft revised Regional Plan-2021 is now placed before the Board for consideration. Many significant facets of NCR have emerged through the Regional Plan. It is interesting to know that the per capita income of the NCR region has consistently been higher than that of the country and also that the rate of growth of both GDP and the per capita income have also been consistently higher than the rest of the country. He further stated that the Sub-Regional Plan for UP Sub-region has also been finalized and was placed before the Board for consideration.

Chairman stated that there have been requests from the participating states to include more areas under the NCR, not only due to proximity to Delhi but also because of the need to integrate the area so as to make the region a more vibrant economic entity. He emphasized the need of connectivity for urbanization, sub-urbanisation, development of twin-cities and an even dispersal of population in the whole region. With better connectivity and planned development, there will be greater dispersal.

Chairman also stated that proposal for constitution of the National Capital Region Transport Corporation (NCRTC) was under active consideration of the Ministry and a final decision was expected very soon. The next important step for NCRPB/NCRTC would be the finalisation of the funding pattern for the three prioritised corridors. He hoped that the pattern of funding would be worked out in a spirit of collaboration and cooperation. He indicated that NCRPB would be the making an initial contribution of ₹200 crore for the RRTS. He expected that the work would be completed by 2016. He stated that the implementation of the RRTS project would not only reduce the travel time, decongest the roads and also reduce pollution levels which will ultimately improve the quality of life in the NCR.

Chairman further stated that the NCRPB was continuing its support for development of infrastructure projects not only in the NCR but in the counter magnets too, and has so far provided loans for 277 infrastructure projects worth ₹18994 crore up to March, 2013. The actual loan disbursement had increased to ₹6464 crore in March, 2013 from ₹6045 crore in March, 2012.

Chairman appreciated that the Board had raised ₹1100 crore from domestic capital market, and also drawn an amount of ₹137.64 crore from the Asian Development Bank and ₹108.45 crore from KfW during 2012-13. He also noted that the Board has maintained its track record of 100 percent recovery of loans. This good financial management has been reflected in the credit rating of 'AAA with Stable Outlook' from three credit rating agencies, CRISIL, ICRA and FITCH.

Chairman stated that NCRPB has instituted awards from April, 2013 onwards to encourage participating States in the National Capital Region for innovation and excellence in Urban Infrastructure & Civic Management in NCR towns & Counter Magnet Areas. The awards are being given in various categories such as best practices in solid waste management, urban green spaces, urban water management, effective public transport, best project management, etc. The awards are open to the ULBs, development authorities and parastatals of the participating State Governments.

Chairman also stated that to encourage and incentivize States/ULBs for provision of water and sewerage in the NCR in a time-bound manner, in the 32<sup>nd</sup> Board meeting it was decided to provide a Grant of 15% of the project cost. In order to take this initiative further, he informed that the interest rate on loans for priority sector projects was being reduced from 8.25% to 7.25% and for other sectors, from 9.50% to 9%, including a rebate of 0.25% on timely repayments. This will be applicable not only to new loan sanctions but also to loan installments yet to be disbursed by the NCRPB. This measure will further help in making NCRPB loans more attractive. He urged the participating states to take benefit of this facility by posing more projects to NCRPB.

The speech of Hon'ble Shri Bhupinder Singh Hooda, Chief Minister, Haryana was taken as read and copy is at Annexure-II.

- v) The Agenda items were taken up for discussions thereafter one-by-one as below:
- 1. Agenda Item No.1: Confirmation of the minutes of 32<sup>nd</sup> meeting of NCRPB held on 22.3.2012.

The Board confirmed the Minutes of its 32<sup>nd</sup> Meeting held on 22.03.2012.

- 2. Agenda Item No.2: Action Taken Report on the decisions of the 32<sup>nd</sup> meeting of the NCR Planning Board held on 22.03.2012.
- i) Agenda Item No.4: New Financing Pattern for environmental friendly social infrastructure development projects in NCR & CMA towns.

Board noted the status.

ii) Agenda Item No.5: Financing Programme for the Twelfth Plan (2012-17) – Raising of resources from multi-lateral/bi-lateral aid agencies and Capital Markets.

Board noted the status.

iii) Agenda Item No.7: Status of Preparation of Sub-Regional Plans.

The draft Sub-Regional Plan for UP Sub-Region was taken up as Agenda item no.8.

Board noted the status of preparation of Sub-Regional Plans of Haryana & Rajasthan.

Chief Secretary, GNCT-Delhi stated that the Master Plan for Delhi-2021 has already been prepared for the entire NCT-Delhi and suggested that Delhi Master Plan for 2021 may be treated as Sub-Regional Plan for NCT-Delhi.

After deliberations, Board decided that the Master Plan for Delhi-2021 prepared under the provisions of Delhi Development Act, 1957 be treated as Sub-Regional Plan for NCT-Delhi Sub-Region. However, the Master Plan must clearly bring out issues of inter-state connectivity.

[Action: Govt. of NCT Delhi and DDA]

iv) Agenda Item No.8: Status of preparation of Master/Development Plan.

Board noted the status of preparation of Master/Development Plans.

- v) Agenda Item No.9: Status of review and revision of Regional Plan-2021 for NCR.

  The matter was taken up as a separate Agenda item no.7.
- vi) Agenda Item No.10: Status of Regional Rapid Transit System (RRTS) for NCR.

  The matter was taken up as a separate Agenda item no.4.
- 3. Agenda Item No.3: Statutory Items
- 3.1 Agenda Item No.3.1: Annual Report and Audited Annual Accounts for the financial year 2011-12.

Board noted the status.

3.2 Agenda Item No.3.2: Annual Statement of outstanding loans and advances disbursed by the Board during the year 2011-12 & 2012-13 as per Rule 47(1) of NCRPB Rules, 1985.

Board noted the status.

3.3 Agenda Item No.3.3: Annual Statement of outstanding loans and advances received by the Board during the year 2011-12 & 2012-13 as per Rule 47(2) of the NCRPB Rules, 1985.

Board noted the status.

3.4 Agenda Item No.3.4: Approval of BE 2013-14 under the head "Plan (Capital) and Non-Plan (Revenue)" as per Rule 29 of the NCRPB Rules, 1985.

The Budget Estimates for the financial year 2013-14, both under the head "Plan (Capital) and Non-Plan (Revenue)" were approved as proposed in the agenda.

4. Agenda Item No.4: Status of Regional Rapid Transit System (RRTS) for NCR.

Member Secretary, NCR Planning Board informed that the Feasibility Reports of three prioritized RRTS corridors have been completed and Detailed Projects Reports were under preparation. The Expenditure Finance Committee (EFC) headed by Secretary (Expenditure) had recommended for constitution of the National Capital Region Transport Corporation (NCRTC). The National Highways Authority of India (NHAI) has given consent for Delhi-Panipat and Delhi-Alwar RRTS corridors, respectively. Concurrence of NHAI for Delhi-Meerut RRTS Corridor was awaited.

Chief Minister, Haryana suggested that RRTS should be considered as National Project and funded accordingly.

LG, Delhi suggested that emphasis should be given on integration of RRTS with other transport modes all along the corridors.

Chief Minister, Delhi stated that a final re-look may be given to the RRTS alignment within Delhi.

Vice-Chairman, UP State Planning Commission suggested modification of the alignment of the Delhi-Meerut RRTS corridor.

Chairman suggested that metro, monorail and BRTS should be utilized as feeder services to the RRTS. He added that the funding pattern for the RRTS needs to be decided in a spirit of collaboration and cooperation between all the four participating States.

Member Secretary, NCR Planning Board informed that the RRTS alignments have been finalized in consultation with the participating States.

It was decided that a final meeting with all the participating States may be held to freeze the alignments.

Regarding funding pattern, it was suggested by the Chairman that a Consultant be appointed to finalize the financial model for RRTS.

[Action: Participating States and NCRPB]

5. Agenda Item No.5: Projects/Studies approved by the Project Sanctioning & Monitoring Group (PSMG).

Board noted the status. Further, while reviewing the status of loan released by the Board, Chairman, NCRPB informed that the Govt. of Haryana has taken a lead in availing soft loans from NCRPB for physical & social infrastructure projects and requested Govts. of UP and Rajasthan also to avail the financial assistance from the Board.

The representative from Govt. of UP informed that project proposals costing ₹ 5000 crore would be submitted shortly.

Representative from Govt. of Rajasthan informed that a project proposals worth ₹ 800 crore for construction of roads falling in DMIC Corridor will be submitted to NCRPB. Chairman suggested that this project may be taken under DMIC funding and additional funding, if any, may be availed from NCRPB.

Regarding the existing interest rates for the power sector, Chief Minister, Haryana requested that interest rates should be reduced as for other priority sector projects. Member Secretary informed that power sector projects are categorized as commercial and other financial institutions like PFC and REC also provide funds for the power sector.

Chairman, NCRPB suggested that Board may review its overall financial position and then take a view.

[Action: Govts. of UP, Rajasthan & NCRPB]

#### iii) Peripheral Expressway

Chief Minister, Delhi stated that construction of Eastern and Western Peripheral Expressways should be expedited and requested Chairman to take a meeting with Environmental Pollution and Control Authority for NCR (EPCA) and the Governments of UP, Haryana and NCT-Delhi for resolving the issues.

Chief Minister, Haryana stated that the progress of construction of Western Peripheral Expressway (WPE) was being monitored by the Monitoring Committee constituted under the directions of the Supreme Court headed by Secretary, Ministry of Road Transport & Highways. He further stated that the delay in the construction was due to certain issues with the concessionaire on whom penalty had also been imposed. Commissioner, NCR Planning & Monitoring Cell, Govt. of UP stated that all land acquisition for Eastern Peripheral Expressway had been completed.

After discussions, it was decided that a meeting will be held under the chairmanship of Union Minister for Urban Development, wherein Chairman of EPCA, Secretary, MoRT&H, Chairman, NHAI, Govt. of UP, Haryana and Delhi will be invited.

[Action: NCRPB and participating States]

## iv) Social Infrastructure and Connectivity between Delhi and Haryana

Chief Secretary, Delhi stated that the revised Regional Plan should give emphasis on development of public sector health and education facilities in the NCR outside NCT-Delhi, so that the burden on GNCT-Delhi in providing such facilities was reduced.

Chief Minister, Haryana stated that Haryana has already taken action on development of education and health facilities in NCR areas. Rajiv Gandhi Education City has been established at Sonepat. However, the main problem was connectivity with Delhi. Govt. of Haryana has been requesting for connectivity with Delhi and the matter was still pending. He further stated that a number of good hospitals with super-specialty facilities have been constructed in Haryana Sub-region including Gurgaon. An AHMS was also being constructed in Rohtak.

Representative of Government of UP informed that they have constructed a Super Specialty Government Hospital in NOIDA, which was functional, while its full-fledged campus was under development.

After discussions, it was decided that the matter of road connectivity be sorted out by the Chief Secretaries of Haryana and Delhi at the earliest.

[Action: Govts. of NCT-Delhi, Haryana and UP]

### v) Metro Rail in UP Sub-Region

Representative of Govt. of UP requested that the Metro be extended from Noida to Greater Noida.

After discussions, it was suggested that the Govt. of UP may set up a Corporation for construction of Metro rail. Consultancy services of DMRC could be availed of, as required.

[Action: Govt. of UP]

## vi) Solid Waste Management

Chief Minister, Delhi emphasized the need for better Waste Management practices in NCR in the adjoining cities like Noida and Gurgaon.

Chief Minister, Haryana stated that solid waste management was also their concern and a common waste management plant was operational for Gurgaon and Faridabad towns with ultra-modern facilities.

After discussions and deliberations, Board approved the draft revised Regional Plan-2021 for NCR for inviting public objections and suggestions under Section 12 of NCRPB Act, 1985.

[Action: NCRPB]

8. Agenda Item No.8: Consideration of Draft Sub-Regional Plan-2021 for U.P. Sub-Region.

Draft Sub-Regional Plan-2021 for U.P. Sub-Region was considered and it was decided that the following observations of the Board be incorporated in the Draft Sub-Regional Plan-2021 before finalizing the same:

- i) Existing Landuse analysis and Landuse Map-2012 of NCR prepared by NRSC, Department of Space, Govt. of India be incorporated in the Sub-Regional Plan-2021.
- ii) Zoning Regulations of Draft Sub-Regional Plan for UP Sub-Region-2021 to be in conformity with Regional Plan-2021.

It was decided that the Govt. of UP will finalize the Sub-Regional Plan for UP subregion after incorporating the above observations made by the Board and after ensuring that it is in conformity with the Regional Plan-2021.

[Action: Govt. of UP]

9. Agenda Item No.9: Request of State Governments for revised funding pattern for preparation of Sub-Regional Plans.

After detailed deliberation, it was decided that NCRPB will provide 100% cost of consultancy for preparation of existing Sub-Regional Plans-2021. However, in future 50% cost of consultancy will be provided by NCRPB for preparation of Sub-Regional Plans.

[Action: NCRPB]

- 10. Agenda Item No.10: Consideration of Proposals for inclusion of additional areas in NCR and identification of Jaipur as Counter-Magnet Area.
- 10.1 Proposal of inclusion of Additional areas in NCR

The proposal for inclusion of Bharatpur district of state of Rajasthan, Bhiwani and Mahendragarh districts of state of Haryana in NCR was considered and approved by the Board.

Chief Minister, Haryana suggested that Board may also consider inclusion of Jind and Karnal districts of state of Haryana in NCR.

It was decided that the proposal for inclusion of these districts may be sent by the State Government to the Board for consideration of the Planning Committee.

[Action: NCRPB]

10.2 Proposal for identification of Jaipur as a Counter Magnet Area

The proposal for Jaipur as a Counter Magnet Area was considered and approved by the Board.

[Action: NCRPB]

11. Agenda Item No.11: Recommendations on NCRPB by 2<sup>nd</sup> Administrative Reforms Commission - 15<sup>th</sup> Report titled "State and District Administration".

Recommendations made by 2<sup>nd</sup> Administrative Reforms Commission in its 15<sup>th</sup> Report titled "State and District Administration" was discussed and the following decisions were taken:

Recommendation No. 1: The Board noted the status.

Recommendation No. 2: The Board has decided that its present composition gives due representation to the entire NCR region and has facilitated broad-based decision making, consistent with the objectives of NCRPB. Inclusion of Chief Ministers of all participating states and Union Territories as well as Chief Secretaries has made the functioning of the Board more effective. Accordingly, in addition to the Chief Ministers, the Chief Secretaries of the participating States and NCT Delhi along with Secretary, HUPA may continue to be members of the Board.

Recommendation No.3: While deliberating on the issue of reconstitution of Empowered Committee along the lines of Executive Committee proposed by 2<sup>nd</sup> ARC, LG Delhi stated that the existing Empowered Committee may be retained and function as the Executive Committee. It was also suggested that Secretary, HUPA may be member of the Empowered Committee. The other members may be invited as and when required by the Board.

[Action: NCRPB]

Recommendation No.4: On the issue of binding nature of the decision of the Board, LG Delhi suggested that the recommendation made by ARC is acceptable as this is drawn from the provisions of the NCRPB Act, 1985. The other members of the Board also expressed similar views.

12. Agenda Item No.12: Review of composition of Co-opted Members of the Board.

The Board has reviewed the composition of the Co-opted Members of the Board and it was decided that the existing co-opted members may be dropped. The Participating States may nominate members within one month to the secretariat of the Board to be considered as co-opted members of the Board.

SILVER OAK HALL, INDIA HABITAT CENTRE, LODHI ROAD, NEW DELHI JULY 1, 2013 Respected Union Minister of Urban Development, Shri Kamal Nath Ji, Minister of State for Urban Development Smt. Deepa Dasmunsi Ji, my esteemed colleagues, members of the National Capital Region Planning Board and friends!

It is indeed my proud privilege to participate in the 33rd meeting of the National Capital Region (NCR) Planning Board, i have no doubt in my mind that this meeting would bring us closer to the objective of realizing a harmonious and balanced development of the National Capital Region. In order to achieve this goal, the infrastructure in the NCR towns will have to be brought at par with that of Delhi. The census figures of 2011 are credible pointers to the fact that Haryana Sub Region has fulfilled the objectives of creation of NCR by effectively checking migration to Delhi as also by attracting reverse migration. The city of Gurgaon has grown @ 293% in the last decade, registering the highest growth rate in the region. The population achieved in 2011 AD was double the population figures projected for 2011 AD in the Regional Plan 2021. In view of such unprecedented growth there is an urgent need to evolve strategies to create and improve the basic infrastructure through enhanced and focused efforts in the entire NCR.

I compliment the Board for completing the review of the Regional Plan 2021 within a relatively short period. The Member Secretary, NCR Planning Board and her team have done a commendable job indeed. In this context, I would like to inform the Board that Haryana (NPR) and Southern Peripheral Road (SPR) need to be implemented expeditiously. A formal request in this regard has been sent to the Ministry of Urban Development by Haryana Government on 12.06,2013.

- 10. Regional Rapid Transit System (RRTS): Two important RRTS projects, namely, Delhi-Gurgaon-Rewari-Alwar (180 Kms) and Delhi-Sonipat-Panipat (111.8 km) are proposed to be executed in the State. These RRTS projects are highly capital intensive and Haryana Government, with its limited resources, will not be able to bear the cost. I would, therefore, request the Ministry of Urban Development to implement these projects as National Projects and provide 100% funding for them.
- 11. Funding for Intra-city Transport: Faridabad is the only city of Haryana covered under the JNNURM. Gurgaon city, despite having a very large catchment, is not included in the JNNURM. Gurgaon is the fastest growing town of NCR, growing @ 293% in the last decade. I would request the NCR Planning Board to recommend inclusion of Gurgaon in the JNNURM, or else provide funds for a minimum number of 200 buses for intracity transport. I would further request that at least 50% of these funds should be provided as grant.
- 12. The State Government plans to develop a cargo airport near Meham at the trijunction of Rohtak, Hisar and Bhiwani districts. For this purpose, a suitable site measuring about 4200 acres has been identified near village Bhaini Bhairon and Bhaini Maharajpur. A request has also been sent to the Ministry of Civil Aviation for site clearance

by the Steering Committee on 20.06.2013. The Ministry of Defence has already conveyed its NOC for the project to the Ministry of Civil Aviation. Approval of the Ministry of Civil Aviation is awaited and I would request the NCR Planning Board to support our proposal and impress upon the Ministry of Civil Aviation to expedite its clearance.

- 13. Enhanced Budgetary Support by NCRPB in the form of Grant-in-Aid to States: The NCR Planning Board has been providing financial assistance in the form of loans for various projects of the State governments. I would strongly recommend that for major projects, support in the form of grant-in-aid should be provided by the Board. Some of the projects in Haryana requiring such financial support include projects of metro connectivity and affordable housing.
- 14. Power: Haryana is augmenting its power resources to address the exponential increase in the demand of power in the NCR. The State Government has been regularly supporting the power utilities by way of equity under the State Plan. In the 11th Five Year Plan, State Government provided Plan support to the transmission and distribution utilities to the extent of Rs. 4687 crore out of which nearly 40% has been spent in the NCR. For the 12th Five Year Plan, State Government has committed State Plan support to the tune of Rs. 7332 crore, of which 50% is likely to be spent in the NCR.
- 15. Allocation of more power from the Central Pool: Since this investment is aimed at improving the power supply in the NCR, the Government of India should give a special grant for the creation and augmentation of power intrastructure in the NCR. Secondly, the

NCR deserves higher allocation of power from the Central Pool of unallocated quota. At present the share is around 15% which needs to be increased to at least 30%, particularly during the Kharif season.

- 16. Tenure of Loan: Presently NCRPB loans for power projects are given for a term of 9 years. The term of loan needs to be increased to 18 years to bring the repayment period on par with the other power financial institutions such as PFC, REC etc.
- 17. Haryana has repeatedly recommended that one of the long term solutions to drinking water problem of Delhi and NCR is the early completion of upstream storages, namely, Renuka, Kishau and Lakhwar Vyasi on river Yamuna. These storage sites were identified long ago and a MoU was also signed on May 12, 1994. But no tangible steps have so far been taken on these projects. I would request the Board to take up the matter with the quarters concerned so that these projects are completed in a time bound manner.
- 18. Drinking water crisis has assumed serious proportions. We need to seriously look at the long term and sustainable solutions. It has become imperative to concentrate on the management of water resources. The water conservation and management projects need to be implemented at individual, organizational and community levels. NCRPB should come forward with appropriate projects at the regional level. Furthermore, the water rechargeable zones may be identified along with their catchment, which may be developed and preserved. As per the "Functional Plan on Water" study conducted by NCRPB, the surface water is underutilized and underground water has been
